Thank you for your email regarding the Yallourn mine rehabilitation plan. We appreciate that you have considered the fauna that currently live in the mine, in particular the Township Field, and how they might be impacted by the lake.

The potential impact on fauna from the lake has been raised in our risk assessments and we are hoping to engage some fauna experts this year to start developing a plan for us. This plan will look at options such as planting more trees away from the mine to create new areas for the animals to live, removing sections of the permitter fence, or trying to relocate the animals to new areas. The lake will take around 24 years to fill so the animals will have time to move away. As you rightly point out, we need to try and encourage the animals to move to safe locations and not end up in dangerous places like the freeway.
